DEAR SIR/MADAM

We would like to invite you to Cracow for the Third Congress of International Researchers of Polish History, which takes place on 11-14 October 2017. It is held every five years and it is a periodic gathering of scholars from around the world who carry out research on Polish history as well as Polish culture, art, and science.

The theme of this year's congress is **THE POLISH - LITHUANIAN COMMONWEALTH: HISTORY – MEMORY – LEGACY**. Our aim is to gather, in one place and at one time, those scholars who are interested in the phenomenon of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth, what it was and how it has been remembered in subsequent centuries. We are also interested in the consequences and manifestations of its existence which can be observed in the later histories of Poland and Lithuania as well as other countries which had been affected by it. During our congress, we hope to focus on the phenomenon of the Polish-Lithuanian state of the early modern period and attempt to answer, *inter alia*, the question to what extent the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth was a unique state and to what degree its history was similar to the histories of the neighbouring nations as well as the states in other parts of Europe and the world. Another important issue which will be addressed during our deliberations is the legacy of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth and its presence in the consciousness of the national groups which had inhabited its territory – Belarusians, Lithuanians, Latvians, Germans, Russians, Ukrainians and Jews.

As you can see, our aims are very ambitious and whether we will manage to achieve them depends on the invited scholars, the number of participants, the audience and those who are interested in the topics we want to deliberate on. We are well aware of the fact that because modern times are so taxing, we hardly ever look back into the past. Cyprian Kamil Norwid once noted that "The past is now - though somewhat far". We, historians, still research this past, but we agree with the English writer Charles Caleb Colton who said, "The present time has one advantage over every other - it is our own".

Let us feel during the Third Congress of International Researchers of Polish History as if we were in the past, present and future at once and devote our time to the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth and its turbulent history. We believe that royal Cracow is a perfect place to discuss Polish history and nowhere else will papers on it given by international scholars sound so momentous.

We cordially invite you to magical Cracow in October. It will not be a waste of time as "time is a special form of space", which we will provide you with.

We look forward to meeting you in Cracow.

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INFORMACJE O KONKURSACH I NAGRODACH

Nagroda Pro Historia Polonorum jest przyznawana co pięć lat za najlepszą książkę historyczną wydaną w języku obcym, dotyczącą historii Polski lub regionu śródutowo-europejskiego (z uwzględnieniem związków Polski z tym regionem).

Celem konkursu jest wyróżnienie dorobku naukowego najwybitniejszych zagranicznych badaczy, zajmujących się polską historią, ale również zachęcenie innych uczonych do podjęcia badań nad problematyką polskiej przeszłości. Nie tylko polscy emigranci, lecz także zagraniczni historycy wnosili i wnoszą nadal wiele nowego do wiedzy o dziejach Polski, odkrywając nieznane wcześniej źródła, ukazując polską historię z nowej perspektywy, a przede wszystkim promując naszą kulturę i historię w świecie.

Zwycięzca konkursu otrzymuje Nagrodę Główną, fundowaną przez Marszałka Senatu Rzeczypospolitej Polskiej oraz statuetkę Galla Anonima. W konkursie wręczana jest również Nagroda Honorowa za całokształt twórczości naukowej, poświęconej Polsce. Autorzy mianowani do nagrody otrzymają pamiątkowe dyplomy. O wyborze laureatów decyduje specjalna Kapituła, której przewodzi Dziekan Wydziału Historycznego Uniwersytetu Jagiellońskiego prof. Jan Święch. Sekretarzem Kapituły jest prof. Maciej Salamon. Nagroda i dyplomy będą wręczone w czasie inauguracji III Kongresu Zagranicznych Badaczy Dziejów Polski 11 października 2017 r. w murach Uniwersytetu Jagiellońskiego.

Nagroda im. Wacława Felczaka i Henryka Wereszyckiego ustanowiona została w 2001 roku przez Polskie Towarzystwo Historyczne – Oddział w Krakowie i Wydział Historyczny Uniwersytetu Jagiellońskiego. Przyznawana jest corocznie, naprawemienne autorowi polskiemu lub zagranicznemu. Konkurs obejmuje publikacje dotyczące dziejów Europy Środkowo-Wschodniej i jej relacji z Polską od średniowiecza do współczesności. Prawo rekomendacji do Nagrody mają wyższe uczelnie, instytucje naukowe oraz wydawnictwa. Wyboru laureata dokonuje Kapituła po rozpatrzeniu prac nadesłanych na konkurs. Fundatorem Nagrody jest Wydawnictwo Literackie.

Patronami nagrody są **prof. Henryk Wereszycki**, znawca dziejów Polski, historii dyplomacji i monarchii habsburskiej, autor wielu dzieł fundamentalnych dla polskiej historiografii oraz **prof. Wacław Felczak**, uczony badający dzieje Europy Środkowej i Wschodniej, ze szczególnym uwzględnieniem Węgier. Ich dorobek naukowy uznawano i ceniono w kraju i za granicą.

W gronie dotychczasowych laureatów Nagrody im. Wacława Felczaka i Henryka Wereszyckiego znalazło się wielu wybitnych historyków Europy Środkowo-Wschodniej, w tym m.in. István Kovács, Jan Němeček, Vasilij Melik, Jan Křen, Peter Vodopivec, Alberto Basciani, Martin Homza, Michał Slivka, Eva Semotanová, Ondřej Felcman, Hans Henning Hahn, Jarosław Hrycak czy Arnold Suppan. Wśród polskich laureatów nagrody znaleźli się m.in. Włodzimierz Mędrzecki, Jerzy Kłoczowski, Michał Pułaski, Piotr Majewski, Marek Kornat, Jan J. Bruski, Andrzej Kastory, Arkadiusz Janicki, Romuald Turkowski.

Nagroda im. Profesora Stanisława Herbsta została reaktywowana w 2010 roku przez Zarząd Główny Polskiego Towarzystwa Historycznego wraz z Zarządem Towarzystwa Miłośników Historii w Warszawie. Nagroda jest przyznawana corocznie, za najlepsze prace magisterskie z historii, ze szczególnym uwzględnieniem dziejów kultury, miast i wojskowości. W każdym roku przyznaje się jedną, dwie lub trzy nagrody, fundowane przez Zarządy Główne PTH i TMH. W tym roku wyjątkowo Nagroda zostanie uroczyście wręczona w Krakowie podczas III Kongresu Zagranicznych Badaczy Dziejów Polski, zwykle honoruje się nią w Warszawie.

The issue of historical memory of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth among the nationalities which once constituted it – the ones that gained modern national identity at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries and their own states in the 20th century – is complicated and not sufficiently documented. To this day, no broader comparative studies (especially cross-national and interdisciplinary) have been undertaken while national historiographies lack references to the points of view of the neighbours. The main challenge is, therefore, to define what, for each of these nations, collective memory is, as well as how advanced the research activities in this field are in all the countries considered. How, over the last hundred years, have national narratives perceived their own history in the context of their belonging to the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth? How did the historical politics of the partitions and, most recently that of the Soviet Bloc, influence these narratives? To what degree was the collective memory of the unwilling heirs employed for immediate political or propaganda needs? To what extent does this process occur today? Aside from the Polish perspective, does a positive image of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth exist among other nationalities? Perhaps it is a multi-national “legacy without heirs”? How have certain nations remembered their gains and losses within the context of centuries-long coexistence within the borders of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth? Is it possible to go beyond post-colonial discourse and memory conflicts? How should a common memory, one which unites and not divides, be built? Is this even possible?

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XXIII Międzynarodowy Kongres Nauk Historycznych Poznań 2020, 23-29 sierpnia 2020

Światowe Kongresy Historyków odbywają się co pięć lat w różnych częściach świata. Ich organizatorem jest istniejący od 1926 roku Międzynarodowy Komitet Nauk Historycznych (Comité International des Sciences Historiques – CISH) oraz wybierane przez Zgromadzenie Ogólne CISH miasto-gospodarz. Podczas XXII Międzynarodowego Kongresu Nauk Historycznych w Jinan, w Chinach w 2015 roku Zgromadzenie Ogólne na miasto-gospodarza następnego, XXIII Kongresu wybrało Poznań. Jak dotąd w Polsce Kongres odbył się tylko raz, w 1933 roku w Warszawie.

Organizatorem Kongresu w Poznaniu w 2020 roku jest Komitet Nauk Historycznych Polskiej Akademii Nauk oraz Uniwersytet im. Adama Mickiewicza w Poznaniu. Obie instytucje pod koniec 2015 roku powołyły do życia Komitet Organizacyjny XXIII MKNH Poznań 2020, na którego czele stoją Przewodniczący KNH PAN, prof. Tomasz Schramm oraz Rektor UAM w Poznaniu, prof. Andrzej Lesicki. Przy Komitecie działa Wydział Wykonawczy, zajmujący się bieżącymi kwestiami organizacyjnymi, na którego czele stoją prof. Krzysztof A. Makowski (Przewodniczący) i prof. Maciej Michalski (Sekretarz Generalny), oraz Biuro Kongresu. Przygotowanie logistyczne Kongresu zostało powierzone Międzynarodowym Targom Poznańskim.

W ramach Kongresu planowane jest zorganizowanie około 70 różnorodnych paneli tematycznych: 3 całodniowe tzw. Major Themes; około 30 sesji specjalistycznych (zgłaszanego przez indywidualnych członków CISH); 15 tzw. Joint Sessions (zgłaszanego przez przynajmniej dwóch członków CISH); około 20 tzw. okrągłych stołów (dyskusji nad ważnym referatem wprowadzającym) oraz 3 sesje wieczorne. Ponadto odbędzie się sesja posterowa dla doktorantów, a także specjalne Research Forum dla uniwersytetów i innych instytucji badawczych, które będą mogły zaprezentować swoje projekty badawcze.

Standardowa opłata konferencyjna uiszczona do 1 marca 2020 wyniesie 120 Euro (później 150 Euro). Opłata dla studentów i doktorantów to odpowiednio 75 i 100 Euro.

Uczestnicy z krajów rozwijających się będą mieli możliwość ubiegania się o dofinansowanie pobytu w Poznaniu w ramach Funduszu Solidarnościowego. Organizatorzy zapewniają zwolnienie 100 uczestników z opłat konferencyjnych, nocleg dla 150 osób oraz pokrycie kosztów podróży dla 60 osób.
